EVENTS SO FAR

International Youth Day Celebration: The International Youth Day is celebrated globally on the 12th of August every year by the United Nations to draw global attention to issues surrounding Youth and this year the theme was "Youth Engagement for Global Action". The month of August campaign mainly aimed at celebrating young people and encouraging youth engagement for global action including their engagement in local communities, national level and the global level especially with the COVID 19 pandemic results.

The LDI in turn had an online challenge to commemorate the event and to inspire the youth to believe that they can make a difference and that their voice matters. Students enrolled in the LDI program (LDIers) shared one global issue that they cared about and made a pledge to what they would do to help solve the problem. The 24 LDIers who took part of the challenge shared their pledges on social media with their network inviting other young people to be active youths to raise their voices and take actions about the issues they care about.

20.21 Cohort Induction Program: With the new academic year came the induction program also known as the LDI orientation. This event took place on the 16th, 17th and 18th of September this year and for the first time, online. Several sessions were held which included an introduction of the LDI program and model, mentoring, SDGs, expectations from the LDI cohort 20/21 and an introduction of the LDI team. The induction program also featured activities like group projects, team building and icebreaking activities.

Commencement of LDI Workshops: The LDI commenced its workshops on the 20th of september 2020. The workshops are held every sunday by 6pm GMT+1 on Microsoft Teams. So far the workshops have covered topics like "Working with SDGs Targets and Indicators", "Integrity and Ethics of Leadership", "Design Thinking, and Effective Leadership through Planning" and "Listening and Effective Interpersonal Communication". All of our workshops are interactive and practical with breakout sessions and encourage application of these important skills that servant leaders should have.

Titan challenge: The titan challenge is a series of weekly and monthly tasks to be completed by the current LDI students in order not to loose points. The aim of this challenge is to facilitate team building and a practical learning environment for teams as they work progressively towards their service projects while engaging in healthy competition. Launched on the 18th of October 2020, this challenge is currently managed by Two Second Year LDIers (Hiba Benkhraba and Meriem Mohtarif). At the end of the session, the team with the most completed tasks wins the challenge.

Commencement of LDI Mentorship Program by Interns and the Moroccan Women Network: Mentorship is at the core of the LDI's leadership development program and has begun for the new cohort. While the two interns (Tonny and Tosin) are primarily responsible for delivering the mentorship sessions to the LDIers, a few of this year's female LDIers were inducted into a special female mentorship program (on the 24th of October) delivered by one of our partners, the Moroccan Women Network. The mentorship program is aimed at providing mentorship for personal and leadership development.

In addition to the mentorship program, all teams receive coaching sessions delivered by the Second year LDIer to assist them as they volunteer at their chosen NGOs and execute projects related to the SDGs to meet the needs of the organization or the host community.



Featured Project: Pastry Puffs

Pastry Puffs is a team from the 19.20 LDI cohort whose team leader was Rime El Mousadik and team members were Rime El Mousadik and Soukaina Jaafari. All members of the team were volunteers at the Al Hanaa Cooperative. An organisation located in Timidiken which bakes local Moroccan foods such as traditional bread, mssemen, krachel as well as other sweets per customer order.

During their time volunteering, the team executed a project that was focused on operations optimization at the Al Hanaa Cooperative by purchasing a large-scale dough kneader. In order to achieve this, the team had to apply their fundraising knowledge acquired at the LDI to organize two fundraiser events performed in Al Akhawayn University. Funds came from generous donations of community members and donations from the Entrepreneurship class (MGT 3302) after receiving approval.

This project was able to lower the extent of manual labor within the organization and improved daily production which in turn translated into meeting the growing customers demands. Although the project has been concluded, effects of the project is still felt by the organization through revenue generation and by its customers through increased access to food.









GLOBAL FEATURE OF THE MONTH: Nobel Peace Prize 2020

On the 9 th of October, 2020, the Norwegian Nobel Committee announced its decision to award the Nobel Peace Prize for 2020 to the World Food Programme (WFP) for its efforts in combating hunger, for its contribution to bettering conditions for peace in conflict-affected areas and for acting as a driving force in efforts to prevent the use of hunger as a weapon of war and conflict.

In the words of Alistair Burt (2020), the scale of this organization's work is deeply impressive. Founded in 1961, the WFP has been a lifeline for the world for almost 60 years and in 2019, it supported 97 million people in 88 countries, delivering 15 billion rations. The success of WFP has been attributed to its impressive leadership and particularly for ensuring that its major funder, the US stayed on board in 2017 when the White House was considering its position in many multilateral organization and agencies.

It was a huge delight to hear such an award was given to WFP because it brought to limelight the commitment and key role WFP plays in multilateral cooperation on making food security an instrument of peace. What made this award more befitting and inspiring was the crucial role WFP played by intensifying their efforts during the pandemic crisis which contributed to a strong upsurge in the number of victims of hunger in the world. From South America, Asia to Yemen, Afghanistan, the Democratic Republic of Congo, Nigeria, South Sudan and Burkina Faso, WFP has continued to take the lead in combining humanitarian work with peace efforts through pioneering various impactful projects. Following the announcement, David Beasley the WFP Head told BBC he was shocked and without words. He gave credit to the incredible men and women at the World Food Programme who put their lives on the line every day for the struggling, suffering people around the world. His hope and message is that the WFP becomes a role model that we have all got to do more.


